# September 7 Deadline to Apply for AzCASE STEM Grants!

The Arizona Center for Afterschool Excellence and Cox Communications invite afterschool programs statewide to apply for one of <a href="mailto:nine">nine</a> \$1,500 grants</a> being awarded to **create new or expanded ways for incorporating STEM based learning** in afterschool or summer programming. Preference will be given to projects that incorporate technology.

Afterschool programs being the experiential, learning environments that they are have more latitude to be creative in introducing youth to STEM than many classrooms. The opportunities are endless! Make sure your application is in by the **September 7th deadline** to give youth in your program a chance to be part of innovative STEM projects afterschool!

The goal is for staff **AND** youth to brainstorm what might be done with STEM in your program that's not happening now. Is there a personal, local, state, national problem the children want to know more about and attempt to solve using technology? Do they want to:

- write, produce, and shoot a Public Service Announcement or mini documentary
- write, produce and film a one act play
- publish a photo story book with photos taken on digital cameras
- record their own oral histories or the history of a family member or
- travel the world, paint artistic masterpieces or learn astronomy on an iPad?

#### **Eligibility**

Afterschool and out-of-school programs serving 6 to 18 year olds are eligible to apply and must submit a grant application with a full description and budget of their planned use for the funds prior to Friday, September 7. Funding can be used to purchase technology such as digital cameras, video cameras, notebook computers, iPads, or software for existing computers or equipment and materials that foster inquiry based learning in science or technology. Your grant proposal MUST describe how the STEM project funding will be used and the educational benefits derived. Grants will be awarded statewide to programs based on their creative and innovative use of age appropriate technology or proposed STEM-based projects for the intended afterschool audience.

#### **Integrating the Common Core into Afterschool Programming**

The expansion of the Common Core State Standards in education opens new doors for out-of-school time (OST) providers to align their work with schools.

The standards are front and center on the national stage as states, districts, schools and teachers prepare for their rollout over the next several years. Many OST programs are trying to figure out what exactly the standards cover, and how to support schools and districts in implementing them.

The timing is right: The Common Core is emerging amid growing calls for expanded learning opportunities and collective action among schools and community partners. This gives the OST field a window to assert itself as a necessary part of children's development and education. The goal need not be to replicate the core work of schools, but rather to complement, support and expand it.

A new brief from the Forum for Youth Investment describes the Common Core, shares examples of OST programs and systems responding, and recommends how the OST field might think about alignment opportunities.

Summer is in full swing! Dehydration, left untreated, can lead to heat cramps, heat exhaustion and very serious heat stroke. ### **Afterschool in the News**

#### Prop 204 Survives Legal Challenge, Will Be On Ballot in November Elections

After two court challenges, Proposition 204, or the Quality Education and Jobs initiative, will officially appear on November ballots in Arizona. The initiative, which seeks to permanently extend the previously temporary sales tax hike, would dedicate the funds collected to education and infrastructure projects, as well as children's health care. Secretary of State Ken Bennett rejected the signatures gathered in support of the measure, on the grounds that the paper copies circulated did not exactly match the copy filed with his office. However, both a lower court and a three-judge panel of the Arizona Supreme Court ruled that the campaign had substantially complied with requirements and Prop 204 will be put before Arizona voters in November.

# **Expanded Learning Tested in Denver and Los Angeles Schools**

Some schools in Denver and Los Angeles will be taking the expanded learning time plunge this fall. The push in Denver began as a proposed hour addition to middle school schedules, but was scaled back to seven trial schools, elementary through high school, after angry parents and logistical snafus proved a challenge. The schools will have the freedom to determine how to use the extra time. Los Angeles Unified School District is using \$1.7 million from the Ford Foundation and the California Community Foundation to provide extra time for high schools to provide real-world learning opportunities for students. These changes come a few weeks after Chicago Public Schools released data on their foray into extended learning time showing mixed results, and as states with recently-approved NCLB waivers weigh what to do with newly-flexible funding for 21st Century programs.

#### **GTECH Afterschool Advantage Computer Lab Grants**

**Deadline: Rolling** 

The GTECH After School Advantage Program is a national community investment program, which provides non-profit community agencies and public schools with state-of-the-art computer labs. These computer centers are designed to provide inner-city children aged five to 15 with a meaningful, yet fun, learning experience during the critical after-school hours, in a safe environment. The Toy Industry Foundation (TIF) welcomes grant proposals from nonprofit organizations seeking full or partial funding for special projects or ongoing programs to improve the lives of children in need. #### **Kaboom Joint Playground Use Grants**

Deadline: August 31, 2012

Joint Use Grants of \$15,000 and \$30,000 are available to communities within the United States for the creation of joint use agreements for playground facilities. The \$15,000 Joint Use Grants will support the opening of at least four playgrounds and are available to cities with populations of less than 100,000 people. The \$30,000 Joint Use Grants will support the opening of at least eight playgrounds and are available to cities with populations of 100,000 people or more. Grant recipients must commit to opening the playgrounds within one year of the grant decision.

The Build-A-Bear Workshop foundations will be accepting and reviewing grant applications on a rolling basis until August 31 for the following funding categories:

The Mr. Holland's Opus Foundation's Special Projects Program targets K-12 after-school music programs that are at least 3 years old or have a music-related umbrella organization that is at least 3 years old. Grants typically range from \$500-8,000 worth of instruments. Eligible applicants include music programs that serve low-income communities and that have little or no budget for musical instruments. Applicants must first submit an online Pre-Qualification form to be considered for an invitation to apply for a grant.
