AzCASE Executive Director Interview On Channel 15 Sonoran Living

AzCASE Executive Director, Melanie McClintock, was interviewed on the February 6 episode of ABC Channel 15's *Sonoran Living* to discuss what 'quality' looks like in afterschool programming and to discuss the new Arizona Afterschool Survey report: *Young Minds Keep Learning Even After the School Day Ends.* She said that many, if not most, afterschool and out-of-time programs have moved beyond simply providing a safe place for children and are focused on specific outcomes.

She added that previous research clearly indicates that the benefits of quality, strategic afterschool programs range from better attendance and higher achievement in school to reduced behavior problems, improved work habits and higher levels of student engagement. Fifteen-year-old Sarabeth Estrada began coming to the Jerry & Helen Wisotsky/Peoria Branch of the Boys & Girls Clubs of Metropolitan Phoenix when she was just seven years old. At the time, the area Sarabeth lived near was riddled with violence and bad influences and she needed somewhere to go after school. "My single dad needed a safe place for me and my siblings to go while he was working long hours," recalls Sarabeth. As the oldest girl in her large family, Sarabeth quickly became the mother figure to her younger siblings after her parents' divorce. She faced responsibilities unknown to many children. Walking into the Club at a young age, Sarabeth's first memory was the feeling of the freedom of being a child.

Afterschool Programs Can Reduce Alcohol Use Among Middle School Students, Study Finds

Results suggest that if prevention researchers build programs with developmentally relevant content, and provide this content in an engaging, confidential and non-judgmental way, it can help middle school-aged children avoid alcohol. The article is published online in the journal *Prevention Science*. "There are many mandatory school-based programs aimed at preventing youth alcohol and drug use, but voluntary after-school models are less common," said Elizabeth D'Amico, the study's lead author and a psychologist at RAND, a nonprofit research organization. "Such programs may become more important as school resources and teachers' time are spread thinner. In addition, they offer parents and students a familiar environment that may be less stigmatizing than being referred to off-site services."
