iPads to the Rescue! Afterschool Program Closing the Technology Opportunity Gap



All children and youth benefit from participating in afterschool programming, but the impact can be particularly profound in low income communities. The Ira A. Murphy School in the Peoria School District serves the highest proportion of free or reduced lunch students in the district, but is ensuring that they get an excellent education during the school day and beyond thanks to the support of their afterschool program. With the help of an AzCASE STEM mini-grant the afterschool program was able to expand its iPad-based, student-driven video announcement program, giving students the 21st Century technological and communications skills so vital to college and career readiness as well as helping level the technological playing field.

Lisa Kluge, the school's Title I Coordinator, oversees the All Star Afterschool Program, which serves an amazing two thirds of the school's 500 K-8 students. When the school surveyed students about what they felt they needed, technology was not high on the list. Kids responded that iPads were for rich kids, and that they just wanted sweatshirts for their sports teams, Kluge recalled. However, she and her colleagues understood that while there might be less access to technology in low income communities, it is vital for their student to gain exposure to technology to even the playing field when they entered high school, college, and the workforce. Students had been lobbying to bring back video announcement created by student reporters to replace the school's standard, administration run morning audio announcements, and with the help of the AzCASE STEM grant the project has taken off this year.

A group of junior high students work together with a faculty advisor afterschool to report on stories ranging from sport team highlights to daily school news. Using the iPads, the budding journalists are able to learn communications and technological skills as well as teamwork. Their hard work pays off as the video announcements are aired throughout the school each morning.

The Ira A. Murphy All Star Program is proof that technology can successfully be incorporated into virtually any afterschool program. Children's intuitive grasp of technology like the iPad and other devices provides a great opportunity for them to discovery learn the process of using them and the chance to teach others - including the adults they work with - the tricks of the trade, as the All Star staff has seen. Here's to other programs following in their footsteps and integrating technology into afterschool!

Flu Activity "Intense" in Arizona

This year's flu season started earlier and hit harder than most. The combination of new more aggressive strains and the worst outbreak of whooping cough in six decades has led to many more falling ill than in a normal year. Google's Flu Map shows that it's not just Arizona that's been affected - almost all of the country has intense flu activity, and there are even shortages of children's Tamiflu in many communities.

The Centers for Disease Control continues to recommend three steps to stop the flu:

- 1. Get a flu vaccine. It isn't too late, and they're widely available.
- 2. Take normal preventative measures. Make sure staff, kids, and families are covering their cough and staying home if their symptoms are accompanied by a fever.
- 3. Take antivirals such as Tamiflu if prescribed by a doctor.

Follow these rules - and maybe stock up on the hand sanitizer! - to keep the flu from getting you and your program down this winter!

Afterschool in the News

Youth Advocates Address Violence Against Children After Sandy Hook Tragedy

In the wake of the tragic Newtown school shooting last month, the White House convened a meeting of youth advocacy organizations in early January to brainstorm ideas to address gun violence and its effects on children and youth. During the meeting Secretary of Education Arne Duncan expressed his concern that not enough is being done to address the issue of violence against children, dangers made even more stark by the shooting at Sandy Hook. In addition to being a voice at the meeting, the Afterschool Alliance contributed policy recommendations underscoring the ability of afterschool programs to provide social and emotional support for all children. These recommendations include targeted funding for programs that prevent youth violence, increased funding for 21st Century programming, universal training for those working with youth in schools and communities, and stronger efforts by schools, families, and community organizations to make sure that all children are have meaningful connections to their community as they grow.

Quality Counts Data Shows Mixed Progress for Education in Arizona

Education Week just released Quality Counts, its annual assessment of states' progress on improving public education. Arizona got a C- but was highlighted as one of five states that are posting large gains in K-12 education. The K-12 Achievement area is the only sector where Arizona improved, jumping from 43rd to 31st in the nation, although still receiving a D+. The state went down in three of the five categories graded - school finance, teaching profession, and standards, assessment and accountability. Arizona's chance for success results remained the same from 2011, ranked 48th out of 50 with a C-. Negative factors include low preschool and kindergarten enrollment, drops in family income and both parental and youth employment figures, and low graduation rates.

The takeaway fro afterschool - there is still work to be done in improving K-12 education outcomes, and afterschool programs are a key to that progress.

The Link Between Family Income & Youth Development

Raising a family can be difficult work, but for low-wage earning parents and families, parenting can be especially hard. This is because low-income work often makes providing for a family difficult and rarely provides benefits to make balancing work and parenting easier, such as paid time off, flexible scheduling, and job stability. Unfortunately, according to a study by the Center for Social Policy, it is the children of low-wage earning parents who are often most affected by their parents' work. An estimated 3.6 million children, many of them minorities, run a higher risk of dropping out of school, becoming pregnant, and growing up too soon to fill the roles of absent adult members of the household as a result of their parents' work.

Though the correlation between family income and youth outcome is both alarming and disheartening, the report suggests that afterschool programs can play an important role in the development of low-income youth by providing children and teens with a safe and supervised environment, reinforcing their academic development, encouraging healthy activities, and by giving their working parents peace of mind.

Beat the Winter Blues With a Travel Project!



Don't let the cold weather get your or your kids down! Use afterschool as a time to hone literacy skills and take a mental vacation with this Travel Brochure project, great for any age!

Materials:

- Things to Include in a Travel Brochure Handout
- Paper and Art Supplies
- Assortment of travel brochures or example brochure as a model
- Various reference materials, print and online, if available

Steps:

- 1. Ask kids to share their travel stories:
 - Where did they go?
 - How did they decide to go to these places?
 - What were their favorite moments in their travels?
 - What was the best place to eat? The best place to stay? The activity that was the most fun?
- 2. If the kids haven't traveled recently, ask them if there are places they would like to go. Ask:
 - Why would they want to go to that place?
 - What do they know about it already?
 - What would they want to know before they go?
 - Where would they look for that information?
- 3. Using the example brochures, learn about what makes a successful travel brochure. Ask:
 - Are there maps? photos? diagrams? other illustrations?
 - What kind of language and vocabulary is used?
 - How is text presented? paragraphs? bulleted lists?
 - Are there specific places highlighted? What kind?
- 4. Have the kids decide a location for their own brochure as well as an audience. Ask:
 - Who is your audience for this brochure? What is your purpose? (Is it to convince your
 parents to take you on a trip? Is it to share with your grandparents so they can learn about
 your adventure? Is it for your neighbors to help them if they decide to go to the same
 place? Is it for yourself, so that you can keep a vivid memory of your trip?)
- 5. Using the Things to Include in a Travel Brochure Handout and the art supplies and paper, have the kids work on creating their own brochures featuring their travel destination.
- 6. Display or share with others!
