Destination Graduation is JAG's Early Warning and Response System

aimed to increase high school graduation rates by intervening early to ensure students enter high school with the skills needed to successfully earn their required ninth grade credits, putting them on track to graduate on time.

The DG/JAG Coach is an interventionist, delivering the JAG model to a targeted group of students; and a facilitator of tiered interventions designed to meet the needs of the targeted grade level.

The National Afterschool Matters Fellowship is a two-year professional development and leadership training program unique in its national reach and incorporation of technology for ongoing collaboration.



Youth Develop Social and Emotional Skills in OST

Youth most often develop social and emotional skills through informal learning and non-formal programs such as their out-ofschool time programs.



This means that some youth benefit from the opportunity to develop these skills while others do not and that **access to quality OST programs is important to all**. Good social and emotional skills predict positive performance, behavior, and satisfaction in life, school, and careers and are crucial to youth development.

A Rosetta Stone for Noncognitive Skills is a

newly published paper about the importance of these skills and how to better understand them, supporting the argument that education and OST programs are important settings where social/emotional competency is developed and should be prioritized.
