Best Practice: Youth Voice & Choice

This week, AzCASE received this fabulous email from an afterschool leader in Colorado regarding our website resources page:

"My students have been using your webpage <u>Websites for Youth</u>, and brought to my attention how helpful it has been for them...As a thank you, one of my students, Danielle, suggested another resource: Free Online Economic Resources for Kids>>

Could you add this to your page? I think it would be a great addition! I researched the article and it is very resourceful which is why I agreed to write to you when she asked me the other day.

We would like to thank you again for the wonderful resources and hope that you add our newly discovered resource to your page! If you put it up, let me know, as I would love to show her the suggestion up...it would be a great motivator for her peers to see too!"

This is a great example of a program that values **youth voice and choice**. In addition to the experience of in depth internet research, these students feel empowered to share their own ideas with their afterschool leader. This afterschool leader empowered Danielle further by actually sending us her suggestion, knowing that she would be thrilled if it were to appear on our Websites for Youth page (we have since added it!) and it "would be a great motivator for her peers".

Research shows that involving youth in planning and allowing them to influence and make decisions about their environments builds confidence, independence, and leadership skills. According to the National Service Learning Clearinghouse, "having opportunities to be heard and to partner with adults in improving schools and communities can help young people master developmental tasks. Additionally, these opportunities can encourage youth to form stronger commitments to school and community and to act as agents of social change," (*Research in Support of Youth Voice and Service-Learning*, May 2007).

Experts suggest several ways to encourage youth voice:

 Give youth opportunities for input into all stages of projects and activities & allow youth to be responsible for elements of each activity

When youth can take ownership over various projects and activities, they are more invested and engaged. Allow them to make decisions about content and process and provide them opportunities to lead.

Gather information from youth through surveys and focus groups

Do a quick poll on paper or utilize an online tool such as <u>SurveyMonkey</u> to gauge youth interest.

Involve youth as researchers

Afterschool providers know that it can often be difficult to develop new and exciting, innovative activities for their programs year after year. The youth in your programs are a great resource for ideas! Get them involved in a brainstorming session about activities and subjects that interest them. 

Summer Meals Reaching Fewer Low-Income Children- <u>Arizona ranks 36th</u> <u>nationally</u>

Fewer low-income children participated in the nation's summer nutrition programs in July 2011 than a year earlier, according to Hunger Doesn't Take a Vacation an analysis by the Food Research and Action Center (FRAC). Only one in seven of the low-income students who depended on the National School Lunch Program during the regular 2010-2011 school year received summer meals in July 2011.

Guest Blogger Barry Ford: Where Do Kids Belong in Making Policy?

Earlier this month, at the *Afterschool for All Challenge* and USTA's First Annual Advocacy Days, I spent a lot of time up on Capitol Hill talking about two issues dear to me: afterschool programs and physical activity for kids. It's the kind of work that is incredibly invigorating, and immensely frustrating. It is invigorating to hear young people, parents, educators and youth workers share their stories and experiences, like the young man whose afterschool program gave him the means, tennis programming, and the motivation, to take control of his diabetes. Or the afterschool chess champ who led a successful campaign to get Mayor Bloomberg to restore funding cut from his school.

Scottsdale May Raise Academic Bar for Student Athletes

The Scottsdale Unified School District is debating whether to require a minimum "C" average for student athletes -- a bold move that would make it the largest district in Arizona to raise the academic bar. The governing board on Tuesday will consider ways to set standards for students who compete in activities after school, including sports, marching band, debate and other clubs. Even if the district ends up not requiring a minimum 2.0 grade-point average, it's likely to add more frequent grade checks and extra-help programs for faltering students.

Circle K Corporation and United Cerebral Palsy of Central Arizona (UCP) have partnered with the city of Phoenix to ensure the future of afterschool programs for Phoenix students this summer. Children's Action Alliance Weighing In: Progress Fighting Obesity Among AZ High School Students

Last week the 2011 Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS), a collection of self-reported data from high school students covering subjects such as tobacco use, sexual health, drug abuse, dietary behavior, and physical activity, was released. After comparing survey results in 2009 and 2011, data show that the number of children describing themselves as obese has decreased from 12.8% to 10.8%. In addition, children are reportedly spending less time glued to the television screen. If correct, this data shines a positive light on declining rates of childhood obesity in Arizona.

Some survey findings, however, raise concern. Less impressive findings reveal that the number of children meeting physical activity recommendations in Arizona has remained unchanged and is below the national average. This is no surprise as the report also shows fewer students report attending Physical Education classes. While the survey is limited to high school students and the data is self reported, it is good information on what Arizona teens say about their own health activities. By continuing to implement creative strategies which allow kids to be active, Arizona's children can avoid childhood obesity and the lifelong complications which accompany this epidemic. Coursera seeks to give everyone access to the world-class education and aims to help students learn the material quickly and effectively. Many studies have demonstrated that standard lecturing is not the most effective mode of instruction. Considerably more effective are the teaching methods that use active learning and interactive engagement between faculty and students, and between students and their peers. Courses are offered in Humanities, Medicine, Biology, Social Sciences, Mathematics, Business, Computer Science, and many others.

Summer Meals Reaching Fewer Low-Income Children- *Arizona ranks 36th nationally*

Fewer low-income children participated in the nation's summer nutrition programs in July 2011 than a year earlier, according to Hunger Doesn't Take a Vacation an analysis by the Food Research and Action Center (FRAC). Only one in seven of the low-income students who depended on the National School Lunch Program during the regular 2010-2011 school year received summer meals in July 2011.
