The vetting process for a draft of Arizona's proposed Afterschool Standards is available for public vetting and comment for just a short while longer!



RFK Project SEATBELT Provides Tools to Prevent Bullying Before It Starts



The Robert F. Kennedy Center for Justice and Human Rights (RFK Center) recently announced the launch of a groundbreaking new initiative, **RFK Project SEATBELT**: a comprehensive set of evidence-based tools designed to help schools, parents, and communities prevent bullying before it starts.

Said Kerry Kennedy, President of the RFK Center:

Bullying is a human rights issue, indeed it's often the first human rights issue young people experience first-hand. In the world of human rights defenders, the rarest of all are leaders who stand up not only to tyrants, but to family, friends, and colleagues within their own communities on behalf of the rights of others. However, in our schools, that's the type of courage we ask our children to show every day, to prevent bullying when they see peers being targeted. RFK Project SEATBELT inspires young people to find that courage and gives teachers, administrators, and parents tools they can use to help.

Common Care As Important as Common Core




Rick Miller, founder and president of <u>Kids At Hope</u>, recently wrote an editorial discussing the new **Common Core Standards**. In it, he says:

I endorse [Common Core] standards. But there is another factor. We must also address the question of **common care**. Without a sense of common care, no new academic standards will create better results.

The research has been absolutely clear for a long time: Students in all grades have a greater chance of success if the adults in the school believe in them, are available not only as teachers but also as caring human beings who understand that the relationship between teacher and student extends beyond the academic.

Common care practices can - and should - extend beyond the classroom. Afterschool and out-of-school time programs and staff play an equally important role in **providing the care and nurturing** that every child needs to thrive.

Afterschool Helps Kids Meet Exercise Needs



Moderate-intensity physical activity has been shown to provide overwhelming benefits for children, supporting their health, wellness and even academic performance. Children need at least an hour of exercise each day for optimal health as they grow. Unfortunately, most kids simply don't get enough.

The Institute of Medicine (IOM) has produced a report, Educating the Student Body: Taking Physical Activity and Physical Education to School, which examines the physical activity and physical education of school-aged children. Findings reveal that, by and large, schools are unable to provide adequate time for physical exercise within the structure of a typical school day.

The report is accompanied by recommendations, including the recommendation that children get more than half the recommended 60 minutes of recommended daily activity during the regular school day through formal gym classes, break-time play, and by creatively incorporating physical activity throughout the day. Afterschool and out-of-school time programs can help children achieve the other 30 minutes of exercise necessary for the health, wellness, and happiness of our children.

Funding Opportunities

Best Buy Children's Foundation Grant

Deadline: July 1, 2013 Award: Up to \$10,000

The Best Buy Children's Foundation is accepting applications from local and regional nonprofit organizations working to provide teens with places and opportunities to develop twenty-first century technology skills with the potential to inspire their future education and career choices. Grants will be awarded for program activities such as computer programming, digital imaging (photography, graphic design, videography), music production, robotics, and gaming and mobile app development. Deadline: July 1, 2013 Award: Up to \$10,000

The US Airways Education Foundation is accepting applications from nonprofit organizations for educational programs that target economically disadvantaged or developmentally disabled children, a with a focus on increasing student interest and academic achievement in science, technology, engineering, and math.

Enhanced Assessment Grants Program

Deadline: July 8, 2013 Award: \$9.2 million

The purpose of this program is to enhance the quality of assessment instruments and systems used by States for measuring the academic achievement of elementary and secondary school students. The Department is holding a competition to support the development or enhancement of a kindergarten entry assessment that is aligned with the State's early learning and development standards and that must cover all of the essential domains of school readiness. We will give priority to early learning collaborative efforts among States (collaborative efforts) in developing this assessment.

Juvenile Justice Information Sharing & Technical Assistance Grant

Deadline: July 9, 2013 Award: Up to \$175,000

This initiative aims to enhance the ability of the juvenile justice, child welfare, mental health, and education systems to share information that will facilitate the provision of services and ensure better outcomes for children, youth, and families. OJJDP will deliver training and technical assistance services to build state, local, and tribal capacities to implement solutions to address this nationwide need. OJJDP will build the capacity of juvenile justice, child welfare, mental health, and education systems and use existing information sharing standards, procedures, tools, and practices across agencies to improve services and outcomes for youth, families, and communities.

Head Start University Partnerships

Deadline: July 26, 2013 Award: \$400,000 - \$500,000

This grant solicits applications for Head Start University Partnerships to support projects that will examine the role that Head Start can play in promoting family well-being, including health, safety, financial security, and school readiness. Projects must be led by researchers working in partnership with one or more Head Start programs. Examples of the types of services of interest include, but are not limited to: sectoral employment initiatives or other intensive employment services; or workforce readiness skills, family language and literacy (including English classes for non-English speakers), mental health services, and domestic violence services. Results of these studies are expected to provide valuable information that can help guide programs in their decisions regarding strategies for improving parent well-being in ways that will ultimately result in positive child outcomes.

Disability & Rehabilitation Research & Training Program Grant

Deadline: August 6, 2013 Award: Up to \$875,000

The purpose of this program is to plan and conduct research, demonstration projects, training, and related activities, including international activities, to develop methods, procedures, and rehabilitation technology that maximize the full inclusion and integration into society, employment, independent living, family support, and economic and social self-sufficiency of individuals with disabilities.
