City of Phoenix Votes to Restore 9 Phoenix Afterschool Program Sites

As a result of pressure from a multitude of community members and advocacy organizations like the Arizona Center for Afterschool Excellence, the **City of Phoenix voted on May 16th to direct a portion of the city's budget surplus to the restoration of nine PAC afterschool program sites.**

In 2007, PAC served more than 9,000 children at 124 afterschool and summer sites in many of Phoenix's most economically disadvantaged neighborhoods leaving the children and their families no low cost alternatives for receiving quality afterschool programming while the parents were working. In the past five years, budget cuts have reduced PAC to 30 sites --- soon to be 39 sites with \$386,000 directed to PAC in the approved city budget for the upcoming fiscal year.

Quality PAC programs give children a safe place to go every day afterschool. Equally important is that PAC programs give low income children, the very experiential learning opportunities that their families can't afford and that increase a child's self worth, sense of belonging, engagement in school, and future academic and social success. Historically, the PAC programs have always filled a niche of serving low income youth whose families lack other affordable options and when a PAC program is not available, these children are left without a safe and nurturing place to go afterschool. The need is as high as it has ever been.

The new city budget is a step in the right direction, but we have a long way to go to giving all of Arizona's youth equal access to quality, low-cost, afterschool youth development programs. **Thank you to all who came out in support of PAC at city budget hearings and through letters to your councilmembers! Your voice makes a difference.**

Kids Care II Taking Applications

Starting May 1, some children on the KidsCare waiting list became covered under KidsCare II, a program similar to KidsCare that is paid for with money from three Arizona hospitals and federal matching funds. Thanks to this funding, nearly 22,000 children on the KidsCare waiting list will be eligible to enroll in KidsCare II. This enrollment is not automatic and families will be asked to

complete new applications.

- Families on the waiting list should update their address and find out if their children are eligible to enroll by calling the KidsCare II hotline at 1-800-377-3536.
- Families on the KidsCare waiting list have just 30 days to apply for KidsCare II when they receive their letter from AHCCCS.

FIRST[®], The LEGO[®] Foundation and LEGO[®] Education Announce 'Graduation Grants' Available To FIRST Robotics Teams

[FIRST[®]](#) (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology), a not-for-profit organization founded by inventor Dean Kamen to inspire young people's interest and participation in science and technology, announced that Graduation Grants will be issued to *FIRST* robotics teams continuing their participation in the *FIRST* family of robotics programs. *FIRST*, in cooperation with The LEGO[®] Foundation and LEGO[®] Education, will provide a total of \$250,000 in grants to fund newly formed [FIRST[®] Tech Challenge \(FTC[®]\)](#) teams that include graduates from [FIRST[®]LEGO[®] League](#) (FLL[®]) teams.

The LEGO Foundation and LEGO Education will provide \$150,000 towards the costs of robotic parts and materials for eligible teams, while *FIRST* will contribute \$100,000 towards registration and additional costs for these newly formed teams. The grants are only available to U.S. teams on a first come, first served basis and are available immediately.

"It's clear that students who advance through our K-12 family of *FIRST* robotics programs have a competitive advantage, both in their skill sets and their opportunities for higher education," said Dean Kamen, *FIRST* founder and president of DEKA Research & Development Corp. "In this time of graduations, we're thrilled that *FIRST* and The LEGO Foundation have found the means to promote and reward students who continue their journey in science and technology through *FIRST*."

"The LEGO Foundation and LEGO Education are excited to continue supporting the growing efforts of the *FIRST* robotics programs," said Stephan Turnipseed, president, LEGO Education North America. "Through strong collaboration with partners like *FIRST*, we are inspiring children through hands on learning to create the future problem solvers of tomorrow."

It is generally accepted that "peer pressure" encourages many young people between the ages of 10 and 18 to begin experimenting with smoking (American Cancer Society).

In Arizona, 25.6% drank alcohol for the first time before age 13 years, other than a few sips (High School Youth Risk Behavior Survey, 2009).

Substance Abuse Prevention

Although participating in an afterschool program significantly puts them at less risk, youth need continual education about tobacco, alcohol, and other drugs in order to make safe decisions. Find lessons and printables to teach youth about smoking, substance abuse prevention, and health and wellness. YMCA of the USA/HSPH Initiative in Afterschool Programs Increases Physical Activity Levels in Youth

A Harvard School of Public Health (HSPH) youth fitness and nutrition initiative conducted with the YMCA of the USA was found to effectively boost physical activity levels and time spent doing moderate and vigorous exercise among children 5-11 years of age enrolled in afterschool programs at YMCAs in four U.S. metropolitan areas, according to a paper published in the March 2012 print issue of *Medicine & Science in Sports & Exercise*.

A small study suggests it's possible: Kids seemed to become more active in after-school programs if they hung out with active kids, and the reverse was true, too. The findings don't prove that friends directly affect how active kids are, and it's not clear whether there's enough of an impact to make a difference in obesity or activity levels throughout the day.

Earlier this year, a faith-based political-action group began putting pressure on Phoenix officials to reinstate some services after noting there was no additional funding planned for after-school programs in the initial version of the city's budget proposal. Featured Activity

Cabbage Indicator

Grades: 3rd -8th

Time: 15-20min

This week's experiment is a very old classic, but it is still a very fun one. We will throw in a slightly new twist, to make it easier and a bit more dramatic.

Materials:

- a jar of pickled red cabbage from the grocery store
- vinegar
- baking soda
- a drinking glass
- 2 cups
- lemon juice

Directions:

1. Open the jar of pickled red cabbage and drain the juice from that into a glass.
2. Pour some of the juice into a saucer.
3. Sprinkle just a tiny pinch of baking soda into the juice. Watch what happens. As soon as the white baking soda hits the red cabbage juice, you get green foam. If you put in much baking soda, you will get a lot of green foam, so be ready to clean up your mess. Eventually, all of your red cabbage juice will turn green.
4. Add a little vinegar to the green cabbage juice. What do you get? Pink foam! Again, there is the potential for lots of mess, so either be careful or have lots of paper towels ready. The coloring in the cabbage juice is an acid/base indicator. It is a chemical that changes color. When it is in an acid (such as vinegar), it turns red. When it is in a base (such as baking soda), it turns blue-green. There are many other chemicals that do this, and chemists use them to measure how acid or basic a substance is. You can use it to find out which substances in your refrigerator are acids and which are bases.
5. Divide your cabbage juice into two cups.
6. Use a little vinegar and baking soda, so that the juice in one cup is red and the other is green. Put one drop of each onto a plate.
7. Add a drop of lemon juice to each. What happened? The red juice stayed red. The green juice turned red. That tells us that lemon juice is an acid.
