Big Boost for Arizona's Educational System

Arizona's educational system for Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics, or STEM, got a big boost today. Freeport-McMoRan Copper and Gold Foundation pledged to back the Arizona STEM Network for another three years. That means after school science and engineering programs, like the one at Joseph Zito Elementary School, can continue. "Kids are working on big important solutions to (alternative) energy, on how electricity gets to your house, on the heat island effect in Maricopa County and what some of the things are if you were going to build a house and how you build it taking into account the heat," explained Darcy Renfro with Arizona STEM Network. A recent report gave Arizona a "D" for its science standards. Organizers hope the Arizona STEM Network can help turn that around. Read more from kpho.com>>

Nutritious snacks don't have to bust budgets, Harvard School of Public Health (HSPH) researchers conclude in a new study that analyzed the cost of foods served in YMCA after-school programs in four U.S. cities. While the prices of individual healthy snacks are typically higher than those of their processed-food counterparts, the researchers found simple strategies made healthy snacks more affordable. Audubon: Children Spending Too Much Time Indoors

The <u>Connecticut Audubon Society</u> says there won't be a next generation of nature lovers if the children of today continue to spend their days indoors. Although there are more threatened bird species in the state than ever, the situation is serious enough for the society to devote its entire "Connecticut State of the Birds 2012" report to the problem of kids not connecting to nature. "We find that children are spending less time outdoors, and their free time is really spent in highly structured activities," said <u>Robert Martinez</u>, president of the Connecticut Audubon Society. "They have very little opportunity for spontaneous interaction with the natural world."

The administration recommended level funding next year, at \$1.153 billion, for 21st Century Community Learning Centers (21st CCLC), the chief federal funding stream for afterschool. But it again proposed to divert 21st CCLC funding to programs that would extend the school day.

Youth Baseball & Softball Program Funding

Deadline: April 1, 2012

The Baseball Tomorrow Fund, part of Major League Baseball, awards on a quarterly basis after a thorough and selective application process. The application evaluation process takes three-to-six months, which depends upon the date that the letter of inquiry is received. This funding is intended to provide funding for incremental programming and facilities for youth baseball and softball programs, not for normal operating expenses or as a substitute for existing funding or fund-raising activities. The program generally considers projects that include capital expenditures for youth baseball and softball programs such as baseball/softball equipment and uniforms, basic baseball/softball field renovations and construction (e.g. infield mix, sod/seeding, bases, dugouts, fencing, field lighting, irrigation system, grading, etc.)

Resources Available to Help Students Access Summer Food Service Program

The Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) provides funding to local governments, nonprofits and other community organizations and institutions to make sure that low-income children up to age 18 receive meals when school is out of session for the summer. The program is underutilized - one out of seven children who receive school lunch during the regular school year take advantage of free summer meals, according to the Food Research and Action Center (FRAC). Many SFSP sites are able to use the federal meal reimbursements to help free up funding that can then be spent on providing enrichment and recreation activities in conjunction with the meals. FRAC and the National League of Cities' Institute for Youth, Education and Families, with funding from the ConAgra Foods Foundation, are working together to help afterschool providers connect their youth to SFSP and other nutrition programs. USDA is offering SFSP webinars, and interested sponsors and volunteers can find more information and register at the SFSP webinar page. The Impact of a 3-Year After-School Obesity Prevention Program in Elementary School Children

Children tend to be sedentary during the after-school hours, and this has deleterious effects on their health. Researchers found that an after-school physical activity (PA) program was effective in reducing adiposity and improving cardio respiratory fitness (CRF) in 3rd grade children from 18 elementary schools in the southeastern United States. The clearest beneficial effects were seen for those youth who attended the sessions at least 3 days/week. However, the favorable effects on % body fat and CRF were lost over the summer. Thus, it is critical to incorporate strategies that attract and retain the children to receive an adequate dose of PA year-round.

Featured Activity!

Black Magic (Color Chromatography)

Grades: 2-5 Time: 15min

Objective: With a paper towel, a black marker, and a cup of water, discover the secret colors hidden in black ink. Explore capillary action--how the water moves up the paper-- and chromatography--how different elements of the ink are carried along at different rates, allowing you to see that black ink is actually made up of many different colors.

What Do I Need?

- * absorbent paper (paper towel or coffee filter)
- * scissors
- * black marker (water-based)
- * water
- * cup or mug

What Do I Do?

- 1. Cut a strip of the paper towel or coffee filter. Make it about 2 inches (5 cm) wide and 5 to 6 inches (13 15 cm) long.
- 2. With the black marker, draw a line across the strip, 1 to 2 inches (2 5 cm) up from and parallel to the bottom
- **3.** Put some water in the cup enough to cover the bottom.
- **4.** Place one end of the paper strip (the one with the black mark closest to that end) in the cup, then fold the other end of the strip over the cup's edge so the strip doesn't fall in. Make sure the bottom of the strip is in the water, but that the black mark in not in the water.
- **5.** Watch as the water flows up the paper. When it reaches the black line, you'll start to see some different colors moving up the paper strip.
- **6.** Leave the paper in the water until the colors go all the way to the top edge. How many colors can you see?
- 7. If you have another black marker, draw a line on a clean, dry coffee filter or paper towel. Put the paper in some fresh water. Does this marker make colors different from the first one?
