Integrating the Common Core into Afterschool Programming

The expansion of the Common Core State Standards in education opens new doors for out-of-school time (OST) providers to align their work with schools. The Common Core is emerging amid growing calls for expanded learning opportunities and collective action among schools and community partners. This gives the OST field a window to assert itself as a necessary part of children's development and education. The goal need not be to replicate the core work of schools, but rather to complement, support and expand it.

An **issue brief** from the Forum for Youth Investment describes the Common Core, shares examples of OST programs and systems responding, and recommends how the OST field might think about alignment opportunities.

Stay Cool. Stay Hydrated. Stay Informed.

Summer is in full swing! Dehydration, left untreated, can lead to heat cramps, heat exhaustion and very serious heat stroke. Watch kids closely for signs of dehydration, including fatigue, dry lips and tongue, low energy, grayish skin, and lack of tears. Children's body temperature rises faster than adults, so it is essential that they get plenty of fluids to keep them cool-especially when it's hot and humid!

Arts Education Afterschool Keeps Kids From Dropping Out

Arts integration has been getting some buzz in the education media this fall. A recent <u>profile</u> of one school in Maryland that took the leap to whole-school cross-curricular arts integration highlights the school culture and academic benefits that are tied to the shift. The positive outcomes aren't limited to the traditional school day, though. Research shows that arts-based programs during out-of-school time help middle school and high school participants keep themselves on track to graduate. The Afterschool Alliace and MetLife Foundation just released a new <u>issue brief</u> highlighting how critical the arts are to providing a strong cadre of youth development options, and shining a spotlight on exemplary programs that are getting it right. As communities look for ways to lower dropout rates and ensure all youth are prepared for a productive, successful future, quality arts-based programming is an important piece of the puzzle!

Texas Looks into Expanded Learning Time

The Texas Legislature is exploring expanded learning time (ELT) for state schools, which would extend school days, school years, or both. Testimony before education leaders in the State Senate from ELT advocated for the change. Houston Independent School District's <u>Apollo 20 initiative</u>, which included ELT in its set of reforms, showed strong academic gains for students. What's unclear in Texas - as in Denver, LA and other areas considering taking the ELP plunge, with the resulting necessary shifts in funding - is how the change would impact afterschool programs.

America's Great Outdoors: Connecting Youth to the Outdoors Grant Program Deadline: September 19, 2012

Grants of up to \$20,000 are available to Forest Service or Bureau of Land Management units and nonprofit organizations, academic institutions, or tribal groups that partner with these agencies for youth programs on public lands.

The Office of Naval Research's STEM education mission is to: foster an interest in, knowledge of, and study in science, technology, engineering and mathematics nationwide to ensure an educated and well-prepared naval and national STEM workforce. Proposals are being accepted for opportunities that would establish successful, sustainable, and affordable long-term, national Navy-sponsored programs targeted at elementary and secondary schools; establish and maintain a pipeline of students, particularly women and under-represented minorities, who will apply for and participate in Naval education and outreach programs; increase the number of domestic students (particularly students from under-represented groups) completing STEM degrees through enhancing student interest and attitudes toward science, technology, engineering, and mathematics; and Strengthen peer, family, and school support for STEM programs, among other goals.
